Sandwich Fair 2025

Spring and summer of 2024 brought many projects and much work to the Sandwich Fairgrounds. We started the process of building our playground along with some new bleachers, a huge upgrade to our tractor pull track and a new tractor pull office. Between the tractor pulling, truck pulling and our new equipment skills competition, the tractor pull arena continues to draw an immense crowd all weekend long.

While a rather large undertaking, we were able to get the playground prepped, built and ready for use by late August which was a huge relief since we weren't positive we would be able to get it ready for the Fair. As we had hoped, it saw countless community members and fairgoers throughout the summer and Fair weekend. It even saw some birthday parties!

However less fun, our biggest project of 2024 was getting a reliable WiFi system built on the grounds which gave us the ability to accept credit cards at our gates and in our souvenir booth, along with giving all of our vendors the WiFi option. Between our Concessions Manager, Office Manager and enlisting the help of a local technology wizard, we were able to achieve our goal and credit card machines were live Saturday morning!

After an unbelievable Friday night and Saturday, the weather didn't cooperate Sunday and Monday. By the end of the weekend, in spite of that, we

welcomed about 30,000 people which is average (and spectacular) considering. Thankfully our crowd is a hearty bunch!

Our winter storage program continues to grow and helps offset much of our summer maintenance costs, allowing us to take our profits from fair weekend and reinvest them in the grounds that we all enjoy so much.

Setting our sights on 2025 we continue to work on the electrical update along with maintenance and repairs to our infrastructure. As always, maintaining and preserving our grounds are huge priorities of the Board of Directors.

We welcomed some new members to our board over the past year and sadly, saw the retirement of one of our greatest supporters, Jim Schipmann. Jim stepped away from the board after nearly 15 years helping to grow our yearly event. We thank him again for his continued dedication and many years on the Board.

As always, we are so grateful to our many employees, volunteers, Board members and the town of Sandwich for their unwavering support!

Dotty Burrows

"To Make the Best Better". That is the 4-H Motto, and it aptly describes Dotty Burrows. This year the Sandwich Fair is happy to dedicate the Sandwich Fair Book to Dotty Burrows.

Dotty Burrows has been associated with the Sandwich Fair since 1986 when she started working for the UNH Cooperative Extension 4-H program in Carroll County. As a 4-H Extension Educator, Dotty was responsible for running the 4-H Program in Carroll

County, including its presence at the Sandwich Fair.

Dotty's 4-H career began at eight years of age, when she was introduced to 4-H by her babysitter in Warren, MA. She has been a 4-Her nearly her whole life, first as a member, then as a leader, then for 25 years as a 4-H Extension Educator, and to this day she continues to volunteer for 4-H through her retirement. She has dedicated her Head, Heart, Hands and Health to 4-H for over 60 years.

Perhaps the most notable part of her 4-H legacy here at the fair is the 4-H Quilt Raffle. Since 1988 4-H youth have measured, cut and sewn a quilt during the three days of the Sandwich Fair. In 1988. Every year as people file into the Smith 4-H building at the Fair, the first thing they see is Dotty mentoring a group of 4-H members working away at their sewing machines on this, now famous, quilt. There are some people who come back every year to buy a ticket in hopes that this will be their lucky year to win the 4-H Quilt Raffle. Originally sponsored by Parent's Country Store in Moultonborough, this fundraiser has raised tens of thousands of dollars over 37 years to support the efforts of the Carroll County 4-H Program.

Dotty also helped found the FFA Woodsmen's Field Day here at Fair. Originally started in 1988, the FFA Woodsmen's Field Day began as a competition between the Kennett and Kingswood High School FFA programs. Today the event continues as FFA students from Kingswood compete against each other for top honors in various woodcutting disciplines.

During the summer months, Dotty can often be found on the fairgrounds in the Smith & Hodge buildings surrounded by sewing machines, cutting mats and notions of all sorts. For several weeks Dotty runs a 4-H Quilt Camp where youth can bring their own fabric, choose a pattern, and with help from Dotty and other 4-H volunteers, learn to sew a quilt. These quilts are the pride and joy of many a 4-Her. On summer evenings, Dotty runs a community sewing group, she is as much a part of the community of Sandwich as she is 4-H. She has lived in town since 1987, was married to Bud Burrows, fair president for 20 years, and has been an integral part of the community ever since. She is known for her role on the Board of Deacons at the Sandwich Methodist Church and has famously run a spaghetti supper for our service men and women on Veterans Day.

For everything Dotty does for the kids, the Sandwich community and the Sandwich Fair, she certainly helps make the best better. We are so glad that Dottie is a part of our Sandwich Fair family.

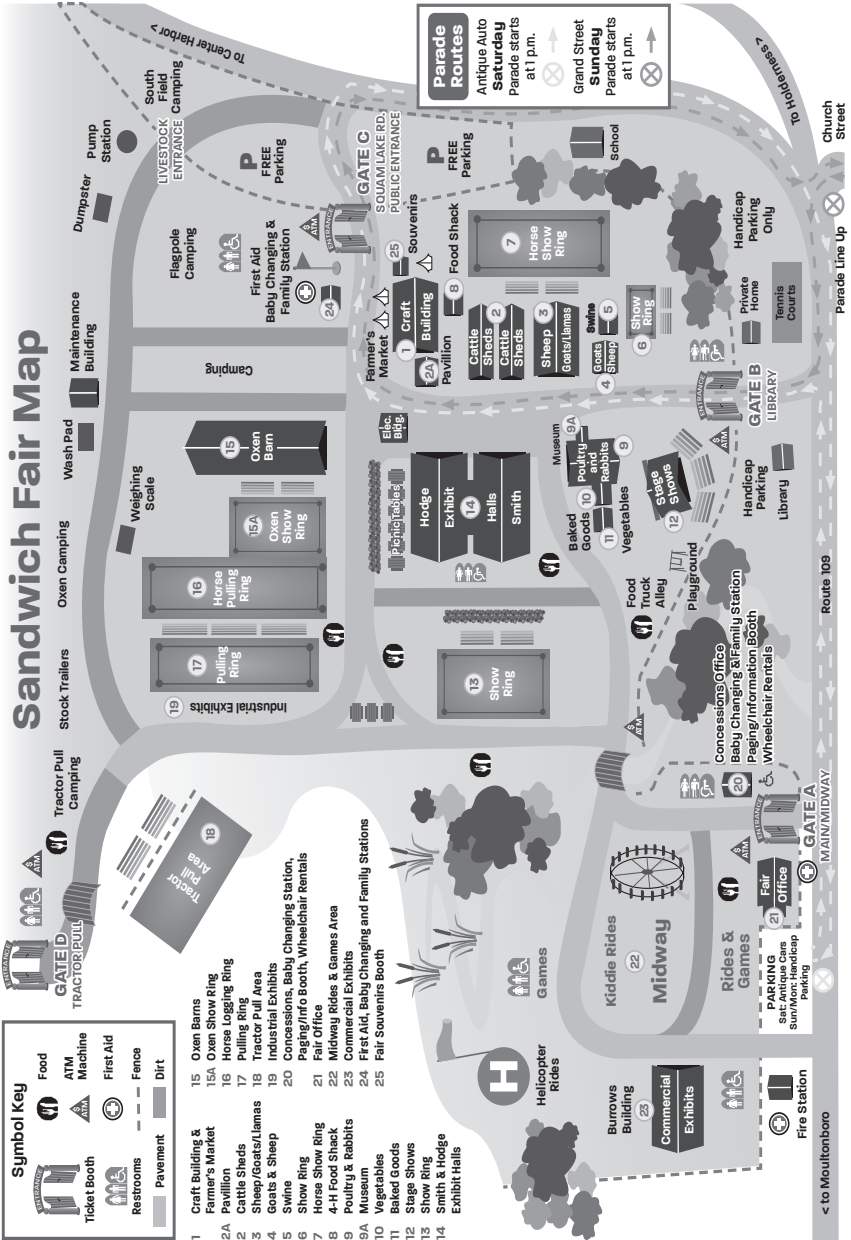

Exhibit hall entries limited to projects by enrolled Carroll County 4-H members. All 4-H members can enter individual articles as part of a club display. Member work and club displays will receive premiums and ribbons according to the class in which correctly entered. More difficult and advanced project work should be submitted to be considered for Mastery and may receive a higher premium if it meets a higher standard. Questions pertaining to entries directed to the County 4-H Program Manager. Exhibits will be set up on Thursday, October 9, 2025, in the afternoon and evening. All exhibits must remain in place until Monday, October 13, 2025, 5:00 p.m., but no later than 6:30 p.m. on Monday, October 13, 2025. Unless otherwise noted there is a limit of 3 items of the same method or style. Duplicate items must be entered as a set, i.e., matched pillows or turned plates. Any articles made from prefabricated kits must be suitable and appropriate for the member's age and skill level. Suitability left to the judges' discretion. No live animals in the 4-H Exhibit Hall.

Cloverbud projects are not judged. Each Cloverbud member (4-H ages 5-7) may enter one project in each project area. Cloverbuds will receive a participation premium of \$.50 per entry and a green Cloverbud ribbon.

CLASS Z – CLUB & COOPERATIVE EXHIBITS

Premiums, Divisions 1-3 Blue \$15 Red \$12 White \$9

Div. 1 Club Exhibit – The club exhibit should show off and celebrate what you do in 4-H. Exhibits can include project work, collections, garden produce, posters, photos, scrap books, educational displays, and fun decoration. The overall club exhibit should be set up by five or more members with 50 percent of 4-H Club members exhibiting. 4-H members should arrange the display with only guidance from their 4-H leaders. Exhibits evaluated on member participation, appearance, creativity, 4-H promotion, club signage and service learning.

Div. 2 Club Educational Exhibit – Any exhibit developed and set by five or more 4-H club members on an educational project-based theme related to club, community service, or 4-H projects. Exhibit should be informative about the subject area and include posters and project items made and arranged by the 4-H members with guidance from their 4-H leaders.

Div. 3 Club Scarecrow – Build a scarecrow that shows off your 4-H Pride. Be creative and use any materials you have available to you. The scarecrow must be handmade by 4-H members, be self-supporting and fit on or next to a display table.

Premiums, Divisions 4-6: Blue \$5 Red \$4 White \$3

Div. 4 Club Scrapbook – Presentation of the current year's scrapbook pages to be judged. Must be separate from previous pages.

Div. 5 Individual or Group Educational Exhibit – Any exhibit on an educational theme related to project, or community service activities by an individual or family group.

Div. 6 Cooperative Projects – two or more members working together to produce and complete a finished product. One premium divided by the participants.

Ribbon & Premium Awards

Regular Premiums Blue \$3 Red \$2 White \$1

Mastery Premiums Blue \$6 Red \$4 White \$2

Mastery – Youth may enter any item for consideration of Mastery. Mastery is a display of skill or knowledge. 4-H projects that show mastery are of a higher quality than those typically produced by a peer. To submit an item for Mastery youth must include a description of the item on a 5 x 8 note card indicating how many years they have been working in this project area and what advanced skills or knowledge have been mastered, along with specific details of the exhibit item that illustrate advanced skills or knowledge. Consideration for Mastery reserved for youth who have been in the project areas for multiple years. Projects submitted for Mastery evaluated on a more stringent standard.

CLASS A – ANIMAL SCIENCE

Any project demonstrating knowledge or skills related to animal science including all large and small livestock, including poultry, and pets. Exhibits may include animal health and care, training, veterinary science, breeds and history.

CLASS B – ART

Includes painting, drawing, and sculpture. Entries should include a 3 x 5 note card describing technique and subject.

CLASS C – AUTOMOTIVE AND MECHANICS

Small engines, snowmobiles, tractor, mechanics.

CLASS D – CIVICS & COMMUNITY SERVICE

Any project that shows connection to community, local, state or national government, or community service.

CLASS E – CLOTHING & TEXTILES

Only one of each article listed may be exhibited. Items exhibited in Fashion Revue will receive the same score and not be re-judged unless improvements have been made. Entries must be marked “re-judge.” Pattern and directions must be included with clothing.

Simple projects: Apron, pincushion, laundry bag, tote bag, potholders, place mats.

Intermediate projects: Blouse or simple dress, jumper, vest, ponchos, pajamas, slippers, stuffed animals, knapsacks, elastic waistband skirts, pants, shorts, bathrobe, unlined jacket or blazer, slacks, skirts, or shorts fitted with waistband.

Advanced projects: Includes specialty fabrics such as stretch jersey, lightweight nylon, or sheer fabrics, velour, slippery fabrics, heavy wool, velvet, leather, suede, vinyl. Suits, coats, denim outfits, evening wear, lined jackets, lined blazers, lined cape. Notebooks showing coordinated wardrobe with information on their characteristics and care.

CLASS F – COLLECTIONS (Stamps, Geology, Coins, etc.) Only current year's collection, properly mounted, labeled and identified.

Basic collection: 10 or more items per collection.

Detailed collection: 20 or more items per collection.

CLASS G – CONSTRUCTION & WOOD WORKING

Exhibit items show knowledge of wood working skills. A project might include a wooden article such as a stool, bench or wooden toy made with hand or power tools, a labeled display of wood working tools.

CLASS H – CRAFTS

Gimp, weaving, leather, metal, copper enameling, shell craft, ceramics, pottery, basketry, decoupage, candle making, Christmas crafts, resealing, posters, other creative crafts.

CLASS I – CROCHETING AND KNITTING

Projects might include a scarf, simple toy or small article, mittens, simple vest, pillows, sweater, shawl, or baby set.

CLASS J – FIELD CROPS AND FRUIT

Project shows examples of garden fruits or field crops and might include individual variety (apples: 4 specimens, strawberries: 1 cup, blueberries: 1 cup, hay: 1 flake), or a harvest collection or display of five or more crops in amounts listed to be judged as a collection.

CLASS K – FISHING

Projects show examples of understanding fishing as a sport and might include posters showing knowledge of fishing or a process, examples of fly tying, line weights, and baits.

CLASS L – FOOD AND NUTRITION

All items with recipe card and source of recipe. They must be on a paper plate and covered with clear plastic. Any of the recipes are eligible for exhibition unless otherwise noted, 4 servings required. Project items might include biscuits, cookies, coffeecake, cornbread, muffins, brownies, a loaf of yeast bread, pastry, or main dish. Exhibits can also show understanding of nutrition such as a home packed lunch box with daily menu, poster or scrapbook showing USDA My Plate, or a balanced menu, or food labeling information.

CLASS M – FOOD PRESERVATION (Canning)

Exhibits, entry blanks and jars must be labeled whether pressure cooker or water bath method used. All entries must be processed. All ingredients must be listed on jar. Dome lid jars must be used. Rings must be removed. No bale jars allowed. Members may enter as either Mentor-Member or Members Own Canning (MOC).

Mentor-Member projects might include a collection of 3 jars with 3 different kinds of vegetables, fruits, pickles, relishes, jams or jellies, Limited to 2 entries, 6 jars all different.

Members Own Canning (MOC) are done exclusively by a single member and might include 1 jar exhibits of vegetables, greens, fruit, meat, pickles, relish, jam, jelly, marmalade, preserve or conserve: limited to 3 entries. A collection of 5 jars with different kinds of vegetables, fruits, pickles, relishes, jams or jellies: collections limited to 3 entries, 15 jars all different.

CLASS N – HEALTH & WELLNESS

Projects related to personal health might include healthy lifestyles, first aid, nursing or medicine.

CLASS O – GARDEN CROPS VEGETABLES

Variety must be listed on entry tag. Exhibit on a paper plate with a tag securely attached. Limit one entry of any species in the quantity listed.

Individual Garden Varieties: Beans: 6 pods; Beets: 3 specimens; Broccoli: 1 head; Celery: 1 bunch; Corn: 2 ears; Cucumbers (pickling): 5 specimens, (dill) 2 specimens, (slicing): 2 specimens; Dill: 2 heads; Eggplant: 1 specimen; Garlic: 3 specimens; Herbs: 1 sprig; Kale: 1 plant; Kohlrabi: 2 specimens; Lettuce: 1 plant; Muskmelon: 1 specimen; Okra: 2 specimens; Onions (dry): 3 specimens; Onions (green): 5 specimens; Parsnips: 3 specimens; Peas (unshelled): 6 pods; Pepper (bell): 2 specimens; Pepper (hot): 5 specimens; Potatoes: 3 specimens; Pumpkin: 1

specimen; Radishes: 5 specimens; Rhubarb: 3 stalks; Spinach: 1 plant; Squash (summer): 2 specimen; Squash (winter) 1 specimen; Sweet Potatoes: 2 specimens; Swiss Chard: 6 leaves; Tomatoes (standard): 3 specimens, (cherry, pear, or grape): 10 specimens; Turnips: 3 specimens; Watermelon: 1 specimen.

Herbs: 5 or more varieties, dried or fresh, labeled.

Garden Collection: 5 or more species of vegetables in the amounts above, displayed in a basket or box (max size: 15" x 18"), with low front, individual specimens labeled, and no commercial advertising visible.

Separate specimens needed for the collection. Vegetables in Garden Collection cannot also be judged as Individual Garden Varieties.

CLASS P – HOME IMPROVEMENT

Interior Design. An accessory for the home, accompanied by before and after pictures of work done, or placement of accessory in the home, mounted on poster board.

CLASS Q – HORTICULTURE AND FLOWER GARDENING

Project exhibits demonstrate work in horticulture.

Outdoor Flowers: 3 specimens of each variety per entry. Landscaping. Starting annuals indoors or dividing perennials. Growing Perennials from seed or arranging the flower border.

House Plants: 1 or more items, each to have a different culture requirement or judged as a collection, including indoor Bulbs, Dish Gardens, and Terrariums containing compatible plants.

Flower Arrangements Bouquets, Winter Bouquets, and living Christmas Greens. Posters or displays that demonstrate understanding.

CLASS R – MAPLE SYRUP

Half (½) pint of maple syrup in a clear glass bottle; Quarter (¼) pound of maple sugar candy. Syrup grade identified on tag. Candy includes recipe card and is displayed on a paper plate, covered with clear plastic. Displays of sugaring equipment or candy equipment need to be labeled and entered as one entry.

CLASS S – NATURAL HISTORY.

Project items showing work in Nature. Collections, posters or photo essays of properly identified and labeled items or forest products with description. Such as wildflower photo essay, insect collection, or wreath made by member.

Basic collection: 10 or more items per collection.

Detailed collection: 20 or more items per collection.

CLASS T – QUILTING & NEEDLE ARTS

Projects showing embroidery, stitchery, and quilting. May include quilted pillows, lap robe, small or large quilts.

CLASS U – PHOTOGRAPHY

Entries can include an individual photo and/or collection of 3-5 photos that follow a theme or tell a story. Photos must be mounted or matted and framed.

CLASS V – FIBER ARTS

Weaving, spinning, and felting.

CLASS W – STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math)

Any STEM based project and might include electronics, computers or coding, robotics, 3-D printing, mechanical design, a science model or kit, a poster or display explaining the science behind a topic, or a display or project showing an experiment or engineering design project which answers a question or solves a problem.

CLASS X – ALL OTHER PROJECTS

Might include a poster, scrapbook, workbook, useful article made as part of the project, educational exhibit or display, and County Records.

CLASS Y – 4-H ACTION EXHIBITS.

Contact 4-H Program Manager to arrange a time and location.



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LIVESTOCK RULES AND REGULATIONS

No animal may arrive earlier than Thursday, October 9, 2025 unless special permission from the chairperson or Livestock Superintendent has been obtained. Animals must remain on the fairgrounds until 5:30 PM, Monday October 13, 2025 at the close of the fair unless other arrangements have been made with the Livestock Superintendent.

1. Animals registered in the name of one or more members of the same family may be entered in either the name of the individual owner or the farm name. If entered by the individual owner those individuals will be considered as "Exhibitors" in both single and group classes. If entered in the farm name the farm will be considered as the "Exhibitor" in both single and group classes.
2. If an individual chooses to enter as an exhibitor, none of his animals may be entered under the farm name. For entries made under the farm name one entry blank will be used with the owner(s) of each animal being indicated.
3. Premiums will be limited to two entries per exhibitor in single classes and one entry per exhibitor in all group classes except get-of-sire and produce-of-dam.
4. Rules 1,2 and 3 will be applied on a "per Breed" basis.
5. Exhibitors must combine entries for get-of-sire or produce-of-dam classes. However, each exhibitor will be limited to one "get-of-sire" and one "produce-of-dam".
6. Any animal shown in a group class must first be entered and shown in its respective single class.
7. Registration papers must be brought to the ring for three-best-females, get-of-sire and produce-of- dam classes.
8. All animals must be registered and owned by the exhibitor 30 days prior to show date.
9. Base dates for age of animals will be September 1 and March 1.
10. No animal may be shown out of its age class.
11. Any senior yearling in milk must be shown either in a separate class, i.e. milking senior yearlings or in the two year class. Milking senior yearlings are ineligible for junior champion, junior get-of-

- sire and breeder's young herd classes.
12. Awards will be made according to merit and no premium will be awarded unless the entry is meritorious.
 13. All decisions of the judge(s) will be final.
 14. Any bull one year of age or older must have nose leads or proper restraint.
 15. All registration papers will be checked for identity and age before showing.
 16. All entries must meet health requirements as prescribed by the New Hampshire Department of Agriculture.
 17. 4-H animals may show in open classes. Entries must be no later than September 30th of current year.
 18. No transportation charges will be paid.
 19. Exhibitors must furnish their own hay.
 20. Entrants are encouraged to participate in the parade on Sunday.
 21. The Sandwich Fair Association, Inc. reserves the right to exclude any animal not vaccinated for rabies at the sole discretion of the Superintendent.

All entries shall remain until 5:30 p.m. Monday
No vehicles on the fairgrounds until 6:00 p.m. Monday

- 4-H age classes are defined as **Novice** is a first-time exhibitor aged 8-13, **Junior** is 9-11, **Intermediate** is 12-13 and **Senior** is 14-18 years of age as of January 1, current year. Cloverbuds, youth aged 5-7, may show in Showmanship classes with an adult or older 4-Her at the discretion of the superintendent. Cloverbuds show for ribbons only, no premiums are awarded.
- **All 4-H Livestock must be entered online by September 15.** Go to thesandwichfair.com for online forms.
- **4-H Exhibitors must present Proof of 4-H Animal Enrollment, NH 4-H Health & Medication Form and Breed Registration (if applicable) Papers to Superintendent on Day of Show.**
- **All animals must be on the Fair Grounds by 8:00 a.m. on Saturday** and remain until 5:00 p.m. Monday or until dismissed by the superintendents. Exceptions will only be made for those members who have received special exceptions from the Carroll County Extension 4-H Staff. Special arrangements must be made at least two weeks prior to the fair.
- Checking in: All exhibitors should check in with their show superintendent or the livestock chair to receive barn assignments. Animals arriving prior to 8:00 a.m. on Saturday, owner and driver will receive free admission passes for the remainder of the fair. **Passes should be picked up from the Livestock Chairman.**
- As with all 4-H shows, exhibitors are expected to care for their animals throughout the fair.
- NOTE: All animals may compete in open classes. **All open entries must be entered separately by September 15 with the fair office.** Open show forms can be found at thesandwichfair.com. Camper reservation forms must be sent to the Sandwich Fair office. **Do not send campsite requests to the 4-H Office.**

4-H Animal Shows Rules and Regulations

- **Identification** - All animals exhibited must be appropriately identified on 4-H Animal Enrollment forms.
- **Age of animal** - Any animal that will be shown in a 4-H class must be at least 4 months old.
- **Outside Assistance** - 4-H members are solely responsible for showing and

handling their animal in the ring. All animals or groups of animals shown must be owned or leased by the 4-H member. Only 4-Hers will be permitted to work on their animals after they arrive at the fair.

4. **Each member is limited to not more than one premium in any division per breed class.** It is recommended that exhibitors bring only one animal per class.
5. The superintendent may divide classes as needed.
6. **Fit & Show** - All youth must participate in Fitting and Showing to be eligible for premiums. They must use an animal that they will exhibit in a type, performance, or market class in the show.
7. **Exhibitor Responsibility** - It is the exhibitor's responsibility to know what class they are supposed to be in and when that class will take place. Exhibitors who miss their class will not be allowed to exhibit in a class designated for another group. Exhibitors who miss their fitting and showing class may exhibit in the rest of the show but will receive no premiums. Exhibitors missing a breed, market, or performance class will not receive premiums in the class missed.
8. **Grade Animals** - In NH 4-H shows where type (breed) classes are stipulated for registered animals only, a youth may exhibit a grade female in the show if they own or lease no more than one other eligible animal of that species. A grade animal is any animal that is not registered. It may be a pure-bred female with no papers **or** a cross-bred male or female. It must meet the age requirement for at least one class in the show. The grade animal may be exhibited within its age group in the registered division, or a separate class may be held at the superintendent's discretion. Grade animals will receive full premiums. Grade males may not be exhibited except in market classes.
9. **Attire** - It is expected that youth will wear appropriate attire when they are exhibiting in a 4-H show. The 4-H attire for all shows except beef is a white collared shirt, solid color skirt or pants, and safe shoes. **No blue jeans or inappropriate clothing may be worn in the show ring.** 4-H Beef exhibitors may now wear clean jeans and a solid collared button-down shirt or polo shirt. No ripped jeans or patterned shirts. Corporate sponsorship, identification or logos are unacceptable at 4-H shows.
10. **Health** - Animal health should conform to current, applicable health standards as set by the New Hampshire Department of Agriculture and announced by the NH State Veterinarian, Dr. Steve Crawford. **In addition, to current health standards,** all animals exhibited at a 4-H event or show must be immunized for rabies at least 30 days prior to and within one year of the 4-H event. Out of state 4-H livestock exhibitors will need an interstate permit which is obtained by applying to the division of animal husbandry.

11. 4-H members are the sole responsibility of their parent or guardian during the entire duration of the fair.
12. 4-H members and parents or guardians shall conduct themselves appropriately, reflecting positively on the 4-H program.
13. **Conduct** - Youth shall represent 4-H and their project to the general public in a positive way, helping to inform them about 4-H and agriculture. Actions must reflect the highest standards of honor and integrity and the best practice relating to their animal project. No type of animal abuse shall be tolerated. 4-H members shall not use or possess alcoholic beverages, tobacco, or controlled substances. All premiums will be forfeited if a 4-H member is found to be in violation of any of the above.
14. Animals are shown at the risk of the 4-H owner or lessor. Any damage to persons or property are the legal and financial responsibility of the 4-H member and their family who owns and leases the animal.
15. Direct criticism or interference with the judge or fair/show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. All judges and fair/show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.



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Sandwich Fair
4-H Animal Fence Talk

3:30 p.m. on Sunday, October 12, 2025 or 2:00 p.m. on Monday, October 13, 2025

4-H Animal Fence talks are a 4-H Action Exhibit with a member's project animal. 4-H members are invited to give a short talk and answer questions from the public with their project animal. This is a 4-H Communication Experience and 4-Hers will be judged on their ability to successfully interact and engage with the public using their animal as the subject. Successful presentations will receive premiums based on their presentation score. The focus of the 4-H Animal Fence Talk is the 4-Her's knowledge of some aspects of their animal. Therefore, it is important that the animal be present. While equipment such as tack, milking or grooming stands are allowed, visual aides are not required. If the 4-Her feels that a poster would enhance their talk, they may bring one. The poster will be hung on the outside of the fence and not be part of the judging.

Small or large animals may be used, and the exhibit topic may range broadly from animal care to an aspect of, or demonstration of, an animal sport or competition. A dog-based exhibit may focus on basic training (sit, stay, etc.), animal care, or canine sport (such as a short agility demo). A talk on goats could be on animal care, husbandry, a milking demo, or fitting and showing an animal. The Animal Fence Talk should typically include only one animal, but some topics may call for more than one such as a team of oxen, flock of sheep, etc.

Each Fence Talk slot will last approximately 30 minutes in duration, but the actual talk may be only 10 minutes in length and be repeated to new audiences as the public filters in and out. Questions from the public can round out the time. 4-H Animal Fence Talks will take place in various show rings. Youth will be assigned a time and place based on availability and show schedules.

Animals used for fence talks must be a 4-H Project Animal and have appropriate paperwork (intent to show form, health forms, etc.). Animals not being shown in a 4-H show at the Fair, such as rabbits or chickens, can be used for the 4-H Animal Fence Talk but must be cleared by the 4-H Program Staff prior to the Fair.

Premiums: Premiums are based on how well the youth presents their animal, demonstrates knowledge, and interacts with the audience.

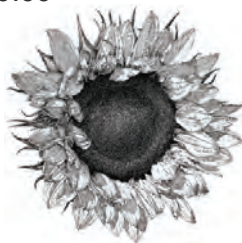

- Entrees must be delivered Thurs., Oct. 9 from 5-7 p.m. or Fri., Oct. 10 from 1-3 p.m. and picked up Mon. between 5:00 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. Vehicles will not be allowed on the grounds before 6:00 p.m. Mon., Oct. 13th.
- Premium may be withheld when the quality is not worthy of an award, even though it may be the only one of its kind on exhibit. Judge's decisions are final.

Rules

- Fruits and vegetables must be grown by exhibitor and be correctly named as to variety.
- Number of specimens called for in premium list must be shown.
- Uniformity in size, shape, color, and maturity is very important. Large size generally denotes over maturity.
- Specimens shall be clean and dirty specimens will be rejected.
- Specimens shall be free of blemishes or damage caused by insects, disease or mechanical means.
- Root crops - cut off tops leaving about 2 inches of leaf stalk. Only the loose outer skins of onions, cabbage, lettuce, etc. should be taken off. Do not peel them too closely.
- Fresh herbs, kale, spinach, celery, and other greens prone to wilting may be exhibited in small jars of water. However, container shall be free of all labels.

- Due to space limitations, large exhibits such as live vegetable plants are discouraged.
- No person may compete for more than one prize with the same variety.
- Commercial farmers/gardeners may not exhibit in the individual fruit and vegetable classes. They may exhibit in the New Variety Division and the Commercial Farm Division.
- Entries to be displayed on paper plates provided by the Fair.
- No exhibits shall contain any invasive species or parts thereof per discretion of the chairperson.

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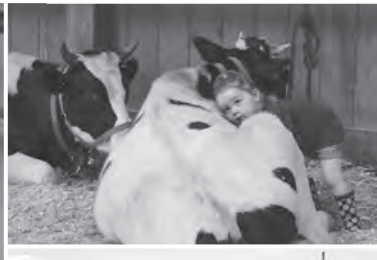
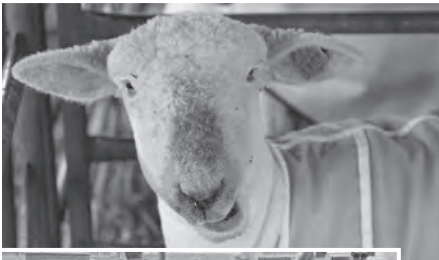
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
